## Word Search List of Ethical Values and Principles

<b>Autonomy</b>	Ability, power, and control to make one's own decisions and live as one chooses based on personal values and beliefs, free from undesired external influence or direction.
<b>Beneficence</b>	Acting with kindness to benefit others.
<b>Confidentiality</b>	Maintaining privacy of information, unless there is consent or a legal requirement to disclose.
<b>Compassion</b>	Deep empathy, concern, and desire to relieve the suffering of others through kindness, sensitivity, and care.
<b>Consent</b>	Free and informed agreement to another's proposal, such as giving consent to a medical treatment.
<b>Dignity</b>	Inherent worth, value, importance, and rights of all human beings.
<b>Duty</b>	Ethical obligations specific to one's role, such as health professionals' duty to care for patients and avoid harm.
<b>Equity</b>	Considering each person's unique circumstances and needs, adjusting treatment, and ensuring access to resources and opportunities, in order to obtain just and equal outcomes and eliminate disparities.
<b>Fairness</b>	Treating people equally and reasonably, avoiding favouritism or bias.
<b>Honesty</b>	Telling the truth, avoiding lies and deception.
<b>Humility</b>	Recognizing one's limitations; not believing that one is better or more important than other people.
<b>Inclusion</b>	Proactively creating environments where all voices are heard, differences are appreciated, and people feel a sense of belonging.
<b>Integrity</b>	Consistently acting according to ethical principles and values.
<b>Loyalty</b>	Staying firm and faithful in one's support towards someone or something.
<b>Justice</b>	Prioritizing needs and approaches of historically excluded groups, including Indigenous, Black, racialized, and 2SLGBTQIA+ people, women, and people with disabilities.
<b>Non-Maleficence</b>	Obligation to avoid causing harm ("do no harm").
<b>Proportionality</b>	Ensuring a proper relation between two or more items. For example, balancing the good that can be achieved with the harm that may be caused; an action should not be more severe or intrusive than is necessary.
<b>Reciprocity</b>	Mutual agreement to help or exchange support between individuals and groups.
<b>Respect</b>	Recognizing and honouring the feelings, wishes, rights, traditions of others, without trying to change or harm them.
<b>Responsibility</b>	Fulfilling moral and legal duties, delivering on commitments, and being accountable for one's actions.
<b>Safety</b>	Preventing injury, reporting errors, and reducing risks of harm to individuals and groups.
<b>Solidarity</b>	Unity based on shared responsibilities, interests, and goals, demonstrating mutual support.
<b>Stewardship</b>	Careful and responsible management of resources entrusted to one's care, such as public healthcare funds.
<b>Sustainability</b>	Pacing ourselves and using resources in a way that does not deplete or permanently damage them, allowing work to continue over a long period of time.
<b>Transparency</b>	Open disclosure of information, communicating decisions and their rationales to all affected parties.
<b>Trust</b>	Belief in another person's character, knowledge, goodness, honesty, and reliability, without fear of harm.
